PEBUNKING MYTHS

by the numbers

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The number of scientific or scholarly studies that **conclusively** demonstrate that sex offender registries make our communities safer.

The percentage of sex offenses committed by people **NOT** on the sex offense registry.

95.9%

28.8%

The number of towns in CT with smaller populations than the number of citizens on the state's sex offense registry.

The CT re-conviction rate for new sex offenses by people on the registry within 5 yrs. of release from prison. (lower than most categories of offenders)

2.9%

22.3%

The disproportionate amount of blacks placed on the CT registry, though this group makes up just 9.7% of the state population

The number of towns in CT with smaller populations than the number of children and family members who are negatively impacted by collateral consequences of sex offense laws.





The **total** number of new sex crime arrests in CT by those on the registry in 5 years after release. Thats just **5.4 per year.**
